

### Scrutiny Report – Adult Social Care Performance: Appendix A

Tables A to F below show the most recently published performance measures from ASCOF for 2017/18 for Somerset (dark blue bar) and the local authorities in Somerset's family group (light blue bars). The red bar shows the England average and the green bar shows the average for the South West region.




#### A. Social Care Related Quality of Life (ASCOF 1A):

**Commentary:** <u>Higher is better</u>. This measure is calculated using a series of measures from the annual Adult Social Care Survey. Scores are out of a maximum of 24. Somerset's performance is in line with the national average but slightly below the average for the South West (which is the second highest performing region).




# B. Proportion of people using social care who receive self-directed support (ASCOF 1C(1)a):


**Commentary:** <u>Higher is better.</u> Somerset's performance against this measure is poor but is improving (see time series below). The current work on reviews means that performance will improve over the next 6 months.




# C. Proportion of adults with learning disabilities in paid employment (ASCOF 1E):




**Commentary:** <u>Higher is better.</u> Somerset's performance in 2017/18 was down slightly on 2016/17. Somerset's performance is slightly below the national and South West averages.






**Commentary:** <u>Higher is better.</u> Somerset's performance is good and is above both the national and comparator group averages. Somerset are ranked 63 nationally (out of 151 local authorities).



### E. Permanent admissions of younger adults (aged 18 to 64) to residential and nursing care homes, per 100,000 population (ASCOF 2A(1)):

**Commentary:** <u>Lower is better.</u> Somerset's performance in 2017/18 was above both the national and South West averages. However, performance so far in 2018/19 shows a significant improvement. The projected outturn would represent a reduction of approximately 50%.



# F. Permanent admissions of older people (aged 65+) to residential and nursing care homes, per 100,000 population (ASCOF 2A(2)):

**Commentary:** <u>Lower is better.</u> Somerset's performance in 2017/18 showed an increase compared to 2016/17. However, performance so far in 2018/19 shows a marked improvement. The projected outturn at the end of September would put us in line with the lowest placing authorities in our family group.
