2. Progress since last Highlight Report

Include evidence of how the plan has incorporated the voice and needs of children

Achievements against planned activity:

- The decision was taken by cabinet in February 2018, to deliver the Family Support Service within Somerset County Council (SCC) from April 2019. Staff engagement has been undertaken by Senior Leadership Team of SCC to plan the transfer of Public Health Nursing staff, which is the immediate focus to ensure service continuity. An event has been held with the School Nursing workforce to develop the offer for September 2018, as the immunisation service will become separate from the specialist school nursing service as of this date. Decisions to be taken by SCC cabinet regarding the future delivery of the Family Support Service.
- The bid was submitted to NHS England for specialist Perinatal Infant Mental Health (PIMH) community mental health team to work with women with more acute and severe presentations (orange red pathway), including support with attachment and promotion of infant mental health. Results announced April 27th 2018.
- We have started to get partners and colleagues involved in the launch of the breastfeeding digital support in Somerset. We will launch fully during national breastfeeding week in June. We continue to recruit breastfeeding champions through services and have self-referrals from



mothers in Somerset.

- Smoking at Time of Delivery (SATOD) had improved to 11.5% (12.4% Year To Date), down from 12.4% in Q2. The issues with the database have been resolved and we now have a quit rate of 54%, with 155 women reported as quit from 289 setting a quit date.
- GP pilot of providing information to Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) application process, with Taunton Deane GP Federation has stalled now working with CLICK federation to get appropriate information sharing agreement in place.
- The Health & Well-Being survey has commenced in schools among children in years 6,8,10 and 12.

Slippage (give reasons and remedial actions)

• A planned multiagency workshop to progress parenting support was cancelled due to the snow and this is now planned for 24th April 2018.

3. Actions and outputs for the next period:

- Parenting event planned for April 24th to promote website resource, agree local process for supporting parents and develop a pathway and menu of interventions.
- Start on the new work-plan.
