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

#### What we are trying to achieve in Somerset $\cdots$

- Best outcomes for all children
- Keeping children in families wherever it is safe do so
  - recognising that all children have the right to family life and that where consistent with their welfare this should be within the birth family or with a 'connected person'
  - Importance of connection, reconnection and reunification
- For those children who come into our care, achieving permanence at the earliest opportunity
- As a corporate parent we should always consider with our partner agencies how we promote and enable children to achieve their full potential in life - 'is this good enough for my child?'

#### What do we mean by permanence?

• We define permanence as the framework of legal, physical and emotional permanence which gives a child a sense of security, continuity, commitment and identity throughout childhood and into adulthood and believe this is achieved by the provision of consistent care, stable relationships and a secure family base in life.

#### What do we mean by permanence?


- We recognise that delay in planning and implementing plans for permanence is detrimental to good outcomes for children.
- We recognise placement moves prior to permanence are detrimental to good outcomes and any unnecessary moves should be avoided.
- Decisions about achieving permanence must take into account the wishes and feelings of children and young people, their birth parents and families.



#### What do we mean by permanence?

Somerset County Council considers that the routes to permanence are:

- Staying / returning home
- Family and friends care
- Adoption
- Special Guardianship / Child Arrangement Orders
- Long-term foster care





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


#### Age range of our CLA under the age of 8 years







#### Gender split of our CLA under the age of 8 years




## Reason for leaving our care




#### Time spent in our care



## Number of placements (moves)








#### What we want to better understand

- For those that return home
  - What the changes were that enabled this to happen and in what timeframe
  - What we can learn from this as a multi-agency partnership to further improve prevention services
- What the blocks are around Special Guardianship Orders
- Time spent in our care is this linked with the work being undertaken or delays, e.g. courts?
- Placement moves for under 2's, almost 70% had at least 1 move
- Placement moves for those in fostering the commentary behind this.
