Review of Parking Fees & Charges 2023

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Summary / Background

- 1. This decision will review and vary the level of parking charges and fees across the Somerset Council area in line with the decision made at the Annual Budget Meeting on Wednesday 22nd February 2022.
- 2. The Annual Budget Meeting contained the following decisions detailed within Paper A Appendix 2, Transformation, Income and Savings by Executive Directorate Paper A Appendix 2 TSIPG, item 5..pdf (somerset.gov.uk)
 - ➤ Item 80 Increase in On-Street Car Parking Fees Increase fees by 10% inflationary costs and look at charging all year round.
 - ➤ Item 81 Increase in Off-Street Car Parking Fees Increase Fees by 10% inflationary costs.

Recommendations

- That the Executive Director for Climate and Place approves the following for implementation in the timescales indicated, following consultation where necessary;
 - ➤ Increase current prices as per the detailed appendices (1-2) in this report;

- ➤ In the event that any surplus is generated, this be ring fenced for projects in accordance with Civil Parking Enforcement legislation and guidelines;
- Approve delegated authority to officers to deal with any representations following the consultation period and approve increase in charges.

Reasons for recommendations

- 4. Parking Charges and Fees are to be increased to reflect recent inflationary pressures and to maintain the encouragement to alternative types of transport to town centres e.g., bus, cycle, car share.
- 5. The increased Charges and Fees will enable the Council to continue to meet its overall transport objectives without increasing an additional demand on the general expenditure fund.

Other options considered

6. The Council has not considered the do nothing approach or increases at a higher level. These options would have been unacceptable as increasing costs would not be covered or an unreasonably high burden would have been placed on the residents and visitors to Somerset.

Links to Council Plan and Medium-Term Financial Plan

- 7. The increases link to the Council's Medium-Term Financial Plan agreed at the Annual Budget Meeting of 22nd February 2023. The increases enables the Council to meet its priorities by encouraging alternative methods of transport and reduce the reliance on the car.
- 8. The proposed increases address the issue of increasing operating costs and enables the Council to maintain its agreed transport and highways objectives.

Financial and Risk Implications

9. The increase in Parking Fees and Charges detailed in Appendix A to E have been identified by the Council as low risk see Paper A – Appendix 2 TSIPG. The increases have been set at levels of inflation and are considered to be balanced

between addressing inflationary pressures and encouragement of alternative methods of transport.

10. Once this decision which details the specific increases the changes will be implemented as soon as practical. The risks associated with this decision are considered low with no specific risk identified.

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11. The level of increased income has been estimated on a flat line basis, i.e. increase of 10% to a tariff with the same level of tickets purchased.

Less an anticipated reduction of usage following the increased charges to other modes of transport. It is anticipated this could be in the region of 20% reducing the full year income as detailed below.

2022/2023 income £9,076,875

Estimated additional income £726,000 (£907,687 less 20% usage) per annum.

Legal Implications

- 12. Parking Charges and Fees are introduced by way of a Traffic Regulation Order for On Street locations and a Parking Places Order for off-street (car parks) using the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 which details the manner and type of restrictions a Local Authority may consider.
- 13. The actual restrictions are introduced in accordance with The Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure)(England and Wales) Regulations 1996. As these proposals are merely changing the charge and/or fees the Local Authority is able to use a Notice of Variation which subject to the required procedures including advertising the changes and providing 21 days notice (minimum) before implementation.

24. Following Local Government Reorganisation, Somerset Council is able to consider parking charges and fees across the whole Council area both on street and off street

This enables recent inflationary pressures to be considered along with maintaining its ability to managed the network efficiently by encouraging changes to alternative methods of transport by the use of pricing.
